## The End Of A Big Wonderful Job



Hopefully, you've taken the opportunity to look through the former manse before it was officially handed over to house Protea Place – a day crisis, refuge centre for women in our community.

Our task was to restore the house to a comfortable, clean condition once the Lighthouse vacated the premises. So, from January to the end of July, it was stripped, sanded, cleaned, painted internally – the garage area converted into a very comfortable double room then to paint and replace the guttering on the exterior.

But along the way, many business and trades people donated their time and skills – as well as products and monetary donations to complete this amazing task. New kitchen, new floor coverings, paint – so much paint – plaster board, air conditioners, security screens, upgraded electricals and plumbing, etc, etc, etc. All this has added enormous value to our property. It is now a beautiful home. That was our aim – to configure the building to be a suitable place for this centre.

Hopefully also, you are aware that this huge job was co-ordinated by Ian Darnell – with Ray Browne leading a small, dedicated team of volunteers to carry out the painstaking restoration of this tired home.

Without these leaders and workers, the task would not be completed – and we would not have the wonderful, valuable asset that now proudly adorns 37 Guy St.

Protea Place Warwick Opens its doors for service on Tuesday 8th August at 10am. We will be open each Tuesday and Thursday from 10 am to 2pm initially. Lunch is served at 12. No appointments necessary and all services are free.

Our focus is on delivering our Dignity Services of lunch, showers, laundry, clothing and toiletries along with information and referral where possible. We have a strong housing focus and understand the challenges in accessing accommodation, however we will assist as much as possible.

Just a reminder to all that Protea Place is a holistic Women's Support Service for women in need who may be experiencing homelessness and disadvantage and needing some support to get back on their feet.

We are not a specialist DFV Service and do not provide accommodation. We assist many women with children but due to the space and model we do not have children on site.

Further details will be available in the coming week once brochures arrive. For now, please feel free to refer women directly on our open days and times.

We encourage services and front line workers to pop in and say hi have a cuppa, meet the staff and see the site. We also encourage warm referrals, including accompanying clients on their first visit if appropriate or required.

Please be patient with us as we find our feet and do our very best to support women in need in Warwick and the southern Downs Region .

It has been a Jumpers and Jazz season like no other, the Bonfire in Killarney has been a first for me and I am still trying to wrap my mind around it all! Please help me in expressing my gratitude to all

the people that volunteered hours of their time to serve in various capacities during this time. The coffee shop was a delight and I do not know how I am going to survive without their smiles, coffee and cake every day!

On top of it, I have just returned from the movie Barbie that I watched with our young women's group and let me tell you it is NOT a children's movie! It was confronting and challenging at times. This movie is not for the fainthearted but addresses issues about gender stereotyping. I was struck by how easily we allow "the world" to tell us or to prescribe to us what is acceptable and how we should live. But if I reflect on this story in relation to Genesis 3, I am struck by the many biblical themes that can be found. If the Psalmist believes the words of Psalm 139:14 that he/she is fearfully and wonderfully made, I wonder what it means to be fully human, and how we become the best we can be in the care and love of God our creator.

The Protea Place drop-in centre for women is completed! What a joy and privilege to be part of this transforming work that God has done in our midst. We thank God for the living Saints that worked tirelessly to transform the Old Girl back into new life. Ray Browne, Ian Darnell and an army of faithful men and women from the church modelled to the community that new life is possible and judging by the number of women who are already enquiring about services, we know that the project is needed, and God has certainly enabled all of it to become a reality.

Our Intergenerational service in July focussed on the parables, on those who spoke about the little things that make a huge difference, like yeast, pearls, and seeds. We had to reflect on modern-day parables, and I could not help to reflect on how a conversation and prayer turned an old building into a fully restored work of art offering life-giving services to those who need it.

How a coffee machine birthed a coffee shop and a hospitality outreach to the whole community!

## Food for Thought....Parables.

Over the last few Sundays, we have been exploring the parables of Jesus were told to answer questions about The Kingdom of Heaven. At times, they have been very easy to relate providing us with a very clear meaning and a definite challenge. Others, however, have many facets that can lead us into new interpretations and challenges.

So, this month, I found a couple from a book titled, "Parables and Fables for Modern Man" written by Peter Ribes SJ. They both involve a tree!

#### <u>Parable No 1</u>

Once upon a time, people used to complain about their pains and sufferings. Each one was sure that their troubles were the worst of the lot. The Master told them a story:

On the day of judgement when all met before God, he allowed them to be free from their sufferings by hanging them on the branches of *The Great Tree of Sorrows*. After that, for a long time everyone was free from pain and sorrow. They could enjoy themselves to their hearts content.

Then, at the end of that glorious time, God asked the people to circle around *The Great Tree of Sorrows* and pick up any sorrows that would be best suited to them. They went round and round the tree, looking at all the sorrows hanging from its branches. It was a hard decision to make! Finally, when all had picked up the sorrows of their choice, God looked at them...and, lo and behold, each one had reclaimed their own!

#### Parable 2

There was a magnificent tree, sturdy, graceful and shady. Its branches were laden with leaves, flowers and fruit, all gently swinging in the cool early morning breeze. But then, one unhappy day the branches began complaining to the tree.

One said, "I am not prepared to remain for ever as just a mere branch! I want to be a tree like you. I want to stand on my own and be independent!" The tree replied, "You are a part of like all the other branches. You give us vibrant beauty and life...all of us make up the tree!"

Then another branch complained, "Why should I have so many leaves and hardly any fruit? I want to have as much fruit as the branch next to me. It's not fair that I should be treated differently!" Very gently, the tree said, "Why does it matter if leaves and fruit are not evenly distributed? All that belongs to all belongs to each! If it were not for your leaves, there wouldn't be so many fruits on the other branches. Remember...we are all one single tree!"

Another joined in, "I am fed up having so many flowers. The insects looking for nectar give me no peace. Those passing by hurt me taking away the flowers. Why should I suffer more than the other branches?" The Tree replied, "Darling, beauty goes with suffering...that's the price! Remember we all make up one tree...your beauty and your suffering are also ours."

Another complained, "Why should theses orchids grow on me robbing my sap and draining my strength? I do not want to belong to the tree!" With great patience and kindness, the tree replied, "Those precious orchids can't live without us. They need our support and service and teach us to be generous. It is because of you that all of us can show compassion and love to our brothers and sisters in need."

It's we, not you, not he alone, not I...It is we all together ...WE ARE THE TREE!

# Another Octogenarian....Lee Wells

Born in Southport in 1940, Lee has had an interesting and varied life that has spanned most of the states of Australia. An Ambulance man, Lee's Dad and his family were posted to Boonah where young Lee attended primary school. Lee was actually baptised in the Presbyterian church, but he became part of the young people at the Methodist Church in Boonah, attending Sunday school and moving into the OK's and the MYF. Through MYF his faith in Christ began to crystalise, and, he actually had a small part in the beginning of Kamp Stacey and those Easter camps.

Lee started an Apprenticeship as a Motor Mechanic in 1955, but his heart was in the Navy where he joined HMS Albatross in 1958 as an Airframe Mechanic. To mark the occasion, his mother presented him with a Bible inscribed with the words, "In all thy ways acknowledge Him", His faith journey began to move a little deeper as he became part of a Bible Study Group that met in a home over a meal and with further involvement in the Nowra MYF. Here he was deeply influenced by the Navy Chaplain who would become his future Father-in-Law and also where he met a young lass who stole his heart and who would become his wife.

Faith began to mean so much more as Lee took on the responsibility of preaching at the small churches around Nowra along with other young navy people who were part of the Nowra MYF. In1961, he went to sea on an aircraft Carrier. Lee and Marg were married in 1964 in Sydney and the family grew with three girls adding to the mix. From Nowra, the little family moved to Perth where the Navy paid for Lee to enrol in Perth University where he was awarded a B. Sc. which lead him to become a Navy teacher of Maths and Physics for the next few years.

Lee became a part of the Nedlands Church in Perth where he served as a Steward. But Lee doesn't stay in one place for long! In 1971, he was sent to Cornwall in England to the Naval School of Meteorology to become a weather forecaster! Then it was back to Nowra, and on to Canberra into the Dept of Defence in 1978. Here, he was once again part of a small group who met in a home where they shared their faith.

His naval career came to an end when he retired in 1980 and the family moved to Brisbane while Lee studied to become a Secondary School Guidance Counsellor. And this is where his story becomes ours as, in this role, he was posted to Warwick High School in 1981 and became part of the Warwick/Killarney Uniting Church. The family soon became a valuable part of the Wesley Uniting Church where Lee taught Sunday School to the Year 8s from Scots, volunteered to be on the Warwick Blue Care Committee where he served as their last Chairman and he also served on the Church Council, something that he did for another three stints.

Lee has been a part of learning and maturing his faith over all those years and it didn't stop in Warwick. He became part of the Dodd's home group, took part in both the Kerygma and Disciple in-depth Study of the whole Bible, and was recently a part of Alpha which he found deepened his faith and where he enjoyed getting to know other people on a deeper and more personal level and where he was privileged to see the evidence of answered prayer.

He was part of the Men's Breakfast, a member of a Worship Committee, always prepared to take a leading part in our worship. He ran the first Blue Card Training, is part of the 4<sup>th</sup> Hospitality Group and is open to helping where needed. He sees his role at present as being Marg's backup ready to help her in all the many, many roles she currently fills.

As Lee looks back over all those years, he feels very much at peace, knowing there is something ahead to look forward to. He believes he has gained much more tolerance and understanding and can see what is really important in life as he "sifts the wheat from the chaff." He knows that his minister father-in-law has had a large influence on his journey of faith as he stood beside him as a guiding light throughout all of life's ups and downs. He sees us here as a close-knit Christian church and looks back on his time at WHS as quite special because of how many of the staff were practicing Christians and how that covertly moulded the ethos of the whole school community. What a wonderful summing up of how the yeast leavens the lump of dough!

Thank you, Lee, for your honesty, your faith, your interesting life, and for agreeing to be interviewed!!
