WORLD DAY OF PRAYER SERVICE



Since 1812, women have encouraged one another to engage in personal prayer and lead communal prayer within their mission groups. Now it is an international ecumenical Christian laywomen's initiative. It is run under the motto "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action" and is

celebrated annually in over 170 countries on the first Friday in March. The movement aims to bring together women of various races, cultures and traditions in a yearly common Day of Prayer, as well as in closer fellowship, understanding and action throughout the year.

Every year, worship service focuses on a different country and a specific theme. World Day of Prayer National/Regional Committees of that country prepare the order of worship on these themes to be used on the next World Day of Prayer.

On the first Friday of March, then, in services all over the world that country becomes the focus of prayer and understanding. Through preparation and participation in the worship service, women worldwide learn how their sisters of other countries, languages and cultures understand the biblical passages in their context. They learn of the concerns and needs of those women and to empathize and feel in solidarity with them.

The country for 2024 is Palestine. Although chosen a number of years ago, this caused some consternation because of the events of last October 7th.

In March 2023, the members of the Warwick Uniting Church accepted the invitation to be the host church in 2024. How to approach this with compassion and sensitivity? As always Rev Ansie knew the best way forward and asked the members of the Ministers Association to their assistance. This resulted in the preparation and presentation of a service of worship shared with 61 men and women and 6 students from Scots PGC. The worship was enhanced by the blended voices of Rev Duncan McDiarmid, Jenny Pearce and Christine Brown leading the singing. Rev May, Pastor Donna from the Churches of Christ and Anna from Scots PGC told the stories of three women of Palestine about Resilience, Truth Telling and Flourishing from the resources and Father Franco assisted Rev Ansie in the Intercessory Prayers. Each person attending received a bookmark with an olive branch attached and during a time of passing the peace exchanged their bookmark with one another.

The message was presented on video by Rev Dr Greg Jenks as he was unable to attend in person. He was recommended by Ian Darnell who had met him in the Middle East a number of years ago. Dr Jenks had served as the Anglican Archbishop of Jerusalem, he spoke of his time there the situations of the people, the many challenges they face daily and the ways they are working quietly among their varied groups to improve relationships within Christian, Moslem and Jewish communities.

Thanks to the generosity of the Courtyard Coffee group, a warm time of fellowship was enjoyed following the worship.

Thank you to all who ensured this was a time of blessing to all.

Some years ago, a lady came to see me about having a church library. Her sister had just died and had left a huge library of Christian fact and fiction and she wanted to give them to a church. She worshipped elsewhere and had found it difficult to find a home for all this amazing array of books. Immediately, I grabbed the offer with both hands, and we started to imagine where we could house them all. Darell built the bookcases, and our library began to take shape.

Because we had accommodated these precious books, the lady who had offered them became one of our members until she left Warwick to move to Tasmania! I began to organise them into categories and others began to bring in more books to overflow our shelves. Down the line, things became a jumble and only a few were borrowing what they could find amidst the muddle.

The time has come to revamp our Library and I will be doing this little by little. It appears that Christian fiction is in demand, and I have many of this genre to donate when I can cull and empty some of the shelves. So, each time I sort books out, I will leave some on a table for people to take before I offer them to Lifeline. Check these out as they stay over a couple of weeks and take home any you think might interest you before they disappear.

As I began this project, I picked up a couple to peruse. Both of them became very hard to put down! The first one was titled, "Son of Hamas" and was published in 2012 in America where it quickly became a best seller. The author grew up in Gaza where his father was one of the founders of Hamas where he really wanted it to be an organisation that cared for the poor and the widows. Sadly, as it grew, it became much more militant, and it morphed into terrorism. His story goes from throwing stones at Israeli trucks and buses through his desire for peace and finally into baptism as a Christian in America!

The next is a work of fiction written by Ted Dekker titled "Outlaw". Ted grew up as the son of a missionary family in Irian Jira and that's where the story is set...a real page turner! So, an idle moment in front of our library can turn up just the book you needed to read! We started to create borrowing cards, but quickly abandoned this because we just want you to enjoy what is there to interest you. We trust you to return it...or keep it should it be just what you needed to read!

The Library is not mine...it is yours! And it might just be God talking to you through the written word! It will be a long process....but, hopefully it will help us to move deeper into our faith. Keep reading, Shalom, Jean.
