

I share with you the official media release from the Uniting Church Queensland synod about the Imminent closure of Protea Place Warwick.

## Protea Place, Warwick - Closure

The Uniting Church was saddened to hear of the closure of Protea Place, Warwick and had no knowledge of the decision by Protea Place prior to last Thursday, 20 June.

We honour the work, support and generosity of the local community, business and corporate sponsors, the Uniting Church and the Warwick congregation for the last twelve months of this venture. We are committed to working with the local community to explore options for ongoing support.

The Church Council, concerned Community members and the Southern Downs Regional Council are looking for ways to continue this valuable service in Warwick. Please pray for us and for the vulnerable women in our community needing this project.

The preaching series A Heart After God's Own, looking at the life of David in 1&2 Samuel is progressing well. Our first session on the 9<sup>th</sup> of June explored: "the kings we serve and desire other than Jesus, who act like computer viruses and take from us " June 23 we focussed on "Chosen and Anointed"- where God would choose the most unlikely people i.e. the outcast, the lonely, the youngest etc to build God's kingdom and that each one of us is chosen and anointed through our baptisms and invited to participate. June 30, we looked at the Facing Giants and discovered that Giants and storms will be defeated if we remember whose we are and who we are. I am looking forward to the last two Sundays of this preaching series and if you have enjoyed it, or would like to see more of it, please let me know! I have been blessed with our worship offering and I want to give thanks to our worship team who have worked so hard during the past six weeks to provide a space for us to meet with our Lord more deeply. We are thankful for the gift of Cathi Brown providing assistance and leadership during our services. #### My Journey

On 15<sup>th</sup> June 1984, the Presbytery of the Downs issued my certificate of accreditation as a Lay Preacher of the Uniting Church of Australia. This followed my completion of the prescribed course of study during 1982 and 1983. To celebrate the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of accreditation, I was privileged to lead worship in Warwick on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> June.

Forty is a prominent number in the Biblical story as it is in my life – I was 40 years old when I completed my certificate.



The Bible records 40 days and nights of rain to flood the earth, 40 years of wandering by the Israelites during the exodus, 40 days of temptation of Jesus in the Judean wilderness, and so much more. In some contexts, 40 indicates the period of a generation, while in others it suggests times of change and reorientation in life.

As I reflected on the past 40 years, it came to me that life is something like a kaleidoscope, with individual pieces falling into hopefully pleasing patterns as the years roll by. For me, the fragments of the pattern are portions of scripture, which have formed and informed my life. From Genesis to Revelation come pieces of guidance and wisdom, and I will mention just a few.

Moses is my biblical hero, and my prayer is that, like Moses, I will be useful and able to the end of life. His address to the people of Israel recorded in the latter chapters of Deuteronomy is an inspiring recommendation to make God the Lord of life.

The Prayer of Jabez recorded in 1 Chronicles 4:9 is challenging. He asks God to –

- bless him in life
- expand his horizons
- be with him in life
- protect him from causing and experiencing pain

Luke 12:48 reminds me that those who experience God's providence in life, have a duty to share with others. One version of scripture reads "Great gifts mean great responsibilities; greater gifts, greater responsibilities!"

Finally, I am both inspired and constrained in life by 2 Corinthians 3:18 "And we, who with unveiled faces all reflect God's glory, are being transformed into His likeness with everincreasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the spirit.

## THANK YOU TO THE HOSPITAL CHAPLAINS

NEWS FROM SYNOD. For many years Uniting Church chaplains have honoured their calling, commitment to and passion for the valuable service they have provided to the church and community. We celebrate with the Public Hospital Chaplains all that God has achieved through their presence and ministry.

In September 2023, it was found unfortunately this ministry can no longer be sustained, and the Synod made the difficult decision to discontinue chaplaincy in public hospitals in its current form on 30<sup>th</sup> June 2024. We have seeking to find other arrangements and are pleased to inform you that at the recent Synod Standing Committee, a position was approved with an initial three-year term of Pastoral Care Manager, to coordinate, support and equip volunteers in pastoral visitation. We will also work ecumenically to establish Hospital Chaplaincy Queensland as a founding member, to provide a best practice model for pastoral care in hospitals, providing quality training and resources for spiritual care providers and volunteers to ensure that God's presence and work is still tangibly felt in our hospitals.

To continue to care for our Uniting Church members, we encourage you, if you find yourself in need of spiritual care in a state hospital, to firstly seek the help of other Christian Chaplains in the hospital, and if you require more help, contact your own minister, or ask for a Uniting Church minister to visit you.

## **Prayer - God of Grace and Mercy**

We give thanks as your church for the privilege to walk beside patients, families and staff in Queensland's public hospitals through the work of our chaplains for over 40 years. We lament that we have not been able to sustain the provision of this important mission in the same way, We pray for guidance as we seek out new ways of being Jesus' hands and feet in hospitals across our state.

God, we pray for every chaplain who has heard your call to serve, to love, and to be the presence of Christ. We give thanks for them and pray blessings over their lives.  Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> July, Ansie and the previous Protea Place Committee members will meet with our SDRC to see how the service can continue.




#### **GENERAL BUSINESS**
